Resolving Temporal Values

Temporal values are placing a higher priority on possessions, hobbies or interests, and personal goals than on relationships with God and others. When people focus primarily on their careers, money, pleasures, or hobbies, relationships with God and others are neglected.



Focusing on temporal values causes us to lose sight of what is important. When our primary focus is on possessions, position, power or prestige, we lose sight of the most important things in life—those things that are permanent such as our relationship with Christ and others. Christ said we cannot serve God and money (*Matt.* 6:24). We either place God first in our lives, or we put other things before Him. Jesus also said, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (Luke 12:34).

Example: When a man treasures his career above his wife, she feels neglected, unloved, and alone. She will search for emotional intimacy in other relationships such as children or other adults to meet her emotional needs. However, focusing on Christ and what He values will keep everything in proper balance.

The burden of daily responsibilities causes us to neglect time with those we love. In Luke 10:38-42, Martha placed a higher value on serving than on relationships with her sister and the Lord. She was distracted from what was essential by the pressures of daily responsibilities. When she complained to the Lord that Mary wasn't helping her, Jesus told her that fellowship with Him was more important than her service.

Our central focus should be on pleasing the Lord. Paul saw the value of counting all his gain as loss that he might win Christ. Because his central focus was on pleasing the Lord, his life goals were subject to that focus (*Phil 3:8-12*). His commitment caused him to sacrifice everything in order to have a closer relationship with God. The things he left behind, such as his position and prestige, he considered as refuse or dung. They were no longer valuable to him nor did they any longer consume his thoughts. "For me, living is Christ," was Paul's attitude. David Livingstone reflected Paul's sentiments when he said, "I am determined not to look upon anything I possess except as in relationship to Christ." Is your focus on relationships or on possessions, position or power? For me, living is ______! You cannot serve two masters. God promises to honor those who choose to put Him first (*John 12:26*).
